Re: Water Deposit/Duplicate Bills



Issue:

We had a landlord request a review of a couple of issues he has with our water billing requirements. Issue one is the requirement that landlords pay off a water/sewer bill if their renter leaves without paying and they want to move another renter in. Issue two is our residential deposit amount.

Michael Monia requested we send him a copy of the bills we send to his renters so he can monitor if they are paying their bill or not. I checked with our attorney and he doesn't see a law against us providing that information as long as Mr. Monia will include in his lease the he be allowed to receive a duplicate bill and have the renter sign a release that the applicant would bring to city hall so we can include it in their application file. We can draft the release.

As for the water deposit. Right now it is \$100. An average delinquent water bill is \$140 plus the reconnect fee. Most times it is two payments owed before water shut off and depending on family size water usage can be pretty high each month. The deposit is to protect the city from water payment losses. We also reimburse a landlord if we collect a back payment from a renter if they turn water on at another location.

Recommendation:

Approve the city to provide duplicate bills for landlords if requested. As for the deposit, consider the impact on landlords, renters, and the city when determining an amount.

Issue:

MoDOT has opened applications for Transportation Alternative Program funds (TAP) for FY2023 with applications due July 15, 2022. TAP funds are for sidewalks, bicycle infrastructure, traffic calming techniques, etc., on state highways or designation roads. One project that came to mind is S. 4th St. sidewalk where it stops just south of Cedar Lane on the west side. It would be nice to connect that sidewalk/trail with Rozier St. where there is an existing sidewalk system. This has also come up for discussion with the RTCA task force looking to improve walkable/bikeable connectivity in Ste. Gen.

Does the board want to consider applying for TAP funding, with \$23.9 million available to outstate Missouri areas? Only \$1.3 million was available last year. There is a minimum 80-20 split with the city's match at 20 or it can be higher.

I would need to work with Cochran Engineering to come up with a total estimated cost to see how it would impact our budget.

Recommendation:

Discuss and see if that's a need that should be pursued with TAP funds available.

Eligible projects include:

- Construction of on-road and off-road trail facilities for pedestrians, bicyclists, and other non-motorized forms of transportation, including sidewalks, bicycle infrastructure, pedestrian and bicycle signals, traffic calming techniques, lighting, and other safety-related infrastructure, and transportation projects to achieve compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990;
- Construction of infrastructure-related projects and systems that will provide safe routes for non-drivers, including children, older adults, and individuals with disabilities to access daily needs;
- Conversion and use of abandoned railroad corridors for trails for pedestrians, bicyclists, or other non-motorized transportation users; and
- Construction of infrastructure-related projects to improve the ability of students to walk and bicycle to school, including sidewalk improvements, traffic calming and speed reduction improvements, pedestrian and bicycle crossing improvements, on-street bicycle facilities, off-street bicycle and pedestrian facilities, secure bicycle parking facilities, and traffic diversion improvements in the vicinity of schools.

Awarded projects will be funded with a maximum 80 percent federal funds and require a minimum 20 percent local match. A project must seek a minimum of \$100,000 of federal reimbursement. The maximum federal reimbursement is \$500,000.

Re: Ward Redistricting

Ste. City of Geneviève Missouri

Issue:

Census numbers have been released for communities and we are required to balance our 4 wards from published Census numbers.

The board chose to approve a percentage of the population count that included the jail facility and two maps were drafted by staff to balance the populations in the four wards. The Regional Planning Commission assisted to verify the count and put the information into GIS. The board then requested making time available at a board meeting for public comment and that was done on May 12, 2022 after advertising in *The Herald* and on Facebook.

The board determined that options 3 & 4 were their top choices. The board now needs to decide which one of the two they wish to adopt.


Recommendation:

Review and discuss which option to bring for adoption at the next board meeting.



OPTION 3 SUMMARY

- Includes those prisoners in jail that aren't transient (per Sheriff's information)
- That eliminates 90% of the prisoners counted in that census block
- This brings total city population to 4,633 (reduction of 366 transient prisoners)
- At 4,633, we need approximately 1,158 per ward
- Currently, according to 2020 census block info, wards are at:
 - Ward 1 1.016
 - \circ Ward 2 1,006
 - \circ Ward 3 1,399 (1,765 before eliminating 366 prisoners)
 - o Ward 4 1.212
- Wards 1 & 2 must expand while Wards 3 & 4 must shrink.
- On Option 2, in order to avoid changing the shape and orientation of the existing wards very much and keep them compact and contiguous, we had to split Rozier Addition subdivision. That seemed to be an impediment to selecting that option.
- Thus in order to avoid splitting up Rozier Addition or any subdivision (for the most part), Ward 1 will expand in a southern direction, which will allow Ward 2 to expand in an a northern and eastward direction.
- The Census block to the south of Ward 1 is large (it is bounded by Seraphin, 4th Street, Linn, Kiefer, Hwy 61 and St. Marys Road) and contains 339 citizens so removing that from Ward 4 (which is necessary for Ward 1 to grow to the south) necessitates Ward 4 growing in a westerly direction.
- In order for Ward 4 to grow westerly, there are only two options to keep it from growing into Pointe Basse subdivision those options are to grow between Hwy 32 & 61 and along Progress Parkway.
- Once all of these changes are made, it leads to some unorthodox shapes for Ward 3 & 4 and I'm not sure they meet the definition of "compact".
- In order to follow US Census Bureau re-districting regulations, we have to calculate each ward's percentage deviation from 1,158, add those deviations together and they cannot be greater than 10%
- The Option 3 map with changes, according to the 2020 census data, would produce:
 - o Ward 1 1,163
 - \circ Ward 2 1,135
 - o Ward 3 1,165
 - \circ Ward 4 1,170
- The Option 3 map deviation is 3.02% which is well within the allowable range.
- All incumbents would remain in their same Ward. This is the only option that produces this result.




Re-Districting – 2020 Census – Option 3



OPTION 4 SUMMARY

- Includes those prisoners in jail that aren't transient (per Sheriff's information)
- That eliminates 90% of the prisoners counted in that census block
- This brings total city population to 4,633 (reduction of 366 transient prisoners)
- At 4,633, we need approximately 1,158 per ward
- Currently, according to 2020 census block info, wards are at:
 - \circ Ward 1 1,016
 - \circ Ward 2 1,006
 - \circ Ward 3 1,399 (1,765 before eliminating 366 prisoners)
 - \circ Ward 4 1,212
- Wards 1 & 2 must expand while Wards 3 & 4 must shrink.
- On Option 2, in order to avoid changing the shape and orientation of the existing wards very much and keep them compact and contiguous, we had to split Rozier Addition subdivision. That seemed to be an impediment to selecting that option.
- With Option 3, in order to avoid splitting subdivisions, maintain a low population deviance, and keep the existing wards semi-oriented as they historically have been, we had to create some oddly shaped wards.
- Option 4 re-orients Wards 3 & 4 so that they are geographically more north-south than east-west. Wards 1 & 2 have very slight changes vs Option 3.
- Ward 4 will expand westward taking in most of the population between Hwy 32 and M Road (Rozier Street).
- Ward 3 expands eastward taking in most of International subdivision.
- This avoids splitting subdivisions (for the most part) but does re-orient a couple of them. With this option, Ward 3 contains both Rozier and International while Ward 4 contains St. Jude, Valle Spring, & Pointe Basse. Thus International & Pointe Basse switch wards.
- In order to follow US Census Bureau re-districting regulations, we have to calculate each ward's percentage deviation from 1,158, add those deviations together and they cannot be greater than 10%
- The Option 3 map with changes, according to the 2020 census data, would produce:
 - \circ Ward 1 1.166
 - o Ward 2 1.132
 - \circ Ward 3 1,193
 - \circ Ward 4 1,142
- The Option 4 map deviation is 5.27% which is well within the allowable range.
- This map keeps two alderpersons in each ward, however Alderwoman Armbruster would move from Ward 4 to Ward 3 and Alderman Rainey would move from Ward 3 to Ward 4. Both are up for re-election in 2023 which is when these wards would go into effect.
